CHAIRMAN'S NOTE

Dear Stakeholders.

As many of you may be aware, GODHULI has been, over the past 28 years, educating thousands of underprivileged children and

mainstreaming them to government schools. We have also been facilitating vocational training in popular Computer Courses, National Teach-

er's Training and Sewing Courses. A large number of our beneficiaries have now settled well in life and thank Godhuli – especially for having

laid their foundation in the early years.

The onset of COVID and its associated lockdowns in 2020 and 2021 brought with it new challenges in educating the underprivileged children

in slums who had little or no access to smart phones. Our teachers, however, worked tirelessly to make the children remain in touch with

education through one to one phone calls, posting of over 1000 You Tube video lessons and distribution of thousands of worksheets on a

weekly basis.

Today, with the return of some normalcy, we continue to run three centres at Meerabagh slums (over two shifts), Nangloi and Kalyanpuri

where more than 425 children get free schooling, uniforms, books, bags, mid-day snacks and other interventions. We are also facilitating

tutorial interventions for about 50 middle school and high school kids besides computer certification courses for another 30-40 youth at

Meerabagh. We are also recommencing our Nursery Teachers Training course – another source of employment especially for young women.

All the same the challenges have increased manifold, given the huge impact of lockdowns which has badly dented both the economic and

educational empowerment of the have- nots.

The cost of operations of Godhuli have always been frugal wherein we have been able to limit the cost of one year's education of a child

(inclusive of mid-day snacks, uniforms, books, bags, excursion trips etc) to around Rs 7000/-. This is possible only as our teachers happily

work against a modest honorarium and our Governing Body members also contribute their time and resources, without taking any compensa-

tion from the Society. Our main source of funding comes from a handful of Corporate/Institutional donors such as Container Corporation of

India (CONCOR) and IRCON International (both CPSEs under Ministry of Railways) Bani Jagtiani Trust and Manibhai and Brothers Charitable

Trust, to name a few. Besides various Samaritans from the public including quite a few personally known to the Governing Body members

have also been contributing over the years.

GODHULI'S Annual Report for 2021-22 is placed below for your perusal.

We invite you for being a part of our small but satisfying initiative by contributing in any manner – your time, resources or money as deemed

appropriate. This will inspire us to work more spiritedly and also empower many more.

1. Introduction

GODHULI is a Charitable Society which was constituted in May 1994 and registered thereafter on 15.09.94, under Societies Registration Act 1860, . The Society aimed to take up projects for the basic education of street children in the age group of six to fourteen years, in terms of original Article 45 of the Constitution of India, (since amended vide Constitutional Amendment No. 86 of 2002), making it a Fundamental Right vide Article 21 A of the Constitution and vide Right to Education Act 2010, for imparting free and compulsory education to all children and revised Article 45 (placing responsibility on the State to provide education to all children up to the age of six years) under which free and compulsory education up to 14 years of age was to be provided to every child by January 26, 1960 which right continues to be denied to many Indian children to this day.

4. Running Centres

Teaching at Godhuli schools continues to be very interactive using practical methods. Students are learning while getting introduced to various ideas and subjects playfully and with enthusiasm. All efforts are made to increase their desire to learn in this way while at the same time they are prepared scholastically and provided with good groundwork to enhance their abilities to learn in their later years.

In addition to regular teaching, the children are also taught about their surrounding environment, likely pollution of air and water and prevention of the same and cleanliness and good manners. They are also introduced to basic good habits and moral duties as also to keep themselves strong physically, mentally, socially and spiritually.

Godhuli's basic motive is to help the students develop their inherent talents as also to identify their own hidden abilities. Special efforts are also made to interact with the parents so that the teachers are getting first-hand information about the normal activities of children as also identify reasons for their occasional absence. These meetings also help the teachers to evolve ways to wean these children away from mischievous activities. The school visits also help parents get sensitized and motivated to the need for children to continue their studies. The basic idea is to initiate various efforts leading to their eventual progress in life.

A new activity of providing Tutorials to students of Classes 6th to 12th has also been initiated during the year to supplement the scholastic efforts at their schools.

The students while being given completely free education are also provided with uniforms, school bags, books, stationery and other study material free of cost. Periodic Medical checkup including eye testing and provision of spectacles is also arranged in various centres.

Summer camps are normally also held in the Schools in May and June, when other schools normally close and cover various activities of learning, reciting rhymes, colouring, chanting mantras, physical activities of dancing, playing with toys, storytelling etc. However, in the current year no summer camps were held because of the prevailing Covid restrictions.

5. ACTIVITIES OF THE SOCIETY IN FACE OF COVID FORCED LOCKDOWNS

When the Covid-19 scenario started in 2020, schools were closed down by the Government. This state of affairs continued till early 2022. It was really disheartening for Team Godhuli, but safety of all stakeholders was the prime concern. The period also witnessed mass exodus of migrant population from cities to their villages. Students studying in Godhuli centres are mostly from the neighbouring slum areas which have large migrant population. This was a most difficult stage as students, the key stakeholders, could not attend school.

The sudden disruptive change was a big challenge and needed to be addressed with constructive approach. Godhuli management stepped forward strategically to motivate the teachers who in turn motivated the students and endeavoured to keep them connected to education so that they did not lose chance to be mainstreamed into Government Schools.

Teachers and staff were very helpful in changing over to the revised mode. They were assured by management of continued job and same level of compensation even while the centres would be closed. IT connectivity platform of smart phones was planned and teachers were motivated and mentored to make small instructional videos on You Tube and Godhuli Shiksha Channel was created. A whatsapp group of all teachers, select Governing Body members of Godhuli and volunteers contributing in this area was created through which everyone viewed the videos, mentored and encouraged the teacher, in due course of time, as the system established.

Towards the later part of the 2021-22, with the easing of the pandemic and related restrictions, Godhuli started weekly distribution of worksheets to the children and therafter classes for limited number of children on a bi-weekly basis following all COVID related protocols. This enabled the children remain at least connected to some sort of education. Significantly we also started training children in Classes II and III on use of tabs, which were very kindly sponsored by our main donor – CONCOR. The digital education of these children is continuing.

Aware of the economic challenges faced by the families of our children, we also distributed ration to the families at the height of the second wave and lockdown.

After the lifting of Lockdown, we have restarted the activities of Computer Classes, Teachers Training and Stiching Classes in collaboration with Rotary Club. New activity of Tutorial Classes for 6th to 9th class have been started this year.

We most heartily thank all our donors for continuing with their support to Godhuli, despite themselves facing hardship. Your support was a great source of encouragement and relief to us during this tough period.

6. WORKING CENTRES

The following three centres operated during the year for the under privileged children. All the centres/schools are named as

BAPU-BA GODHULI SHIKSHA GRIH.

- Meerabagh, PaschimVihar (In two shifts)
- · Nangloi (West Delhi)
- Kalyanpuri (East Delhi)

Meerabagh Centre also coordinated with nearby vocational training centre in providing Computer education to the youth of the area as also Nursery Teacher's Training as in the previous few years

6.1 MeeraBagh Centre

MeeraBagh Slums (B-Block), PaschimVihar, West Delhi

A) Primary Education

Godhuli is running this school for poor children from slums of MeeraBagh and PaschimVihar. The school had been running in a temporary shed located in the the area. The shed structure was renovated recently with Godhuli's own funds

Keeping in view the overall efforts of Godhuli to keep up its commitment to education of slum children, and in consideration of the prevalence of the COVID pandemic for various intervening periods, operations were commenced in July, 2021 and continued in the manner elucidated below:

- 1. Students were distributed worksheets for completing as homework at home. A total of 51,800 worksheets (40,400 in the morning and 11,400 in the afternoon shift) were distributed to approximately 300 students
- 2. Teachers were calling students daily to motivate, guide and encourage the students for completion of homework
- 3. Teachers continued to upload YouTube videos of their respective classes, so that same can be viewed by the children whenever they have access to smart phones.
- 4. During later part of the year, special sessions for restricted number of children were initiated, especially to help the weaker students. This was dome following strict COVID related protocols.
- 5. Regular classes were initially started in Jan'2022 and thereafter continued as per Government regulations. They were constantly guided regarding Social Distancing, wearing masks and maintaining hygiene.
- 6. Total strength of 315 students (225 in Morning shift and 90 in the afternoon shift) were enrolled for imparting education through online methods initially and off line later.
- 7. Number of students mainstreamed was initially low as also many students had shifted to villages. The number has then picked up and the total mainstreaming into Govt. Schools achieved is 108 nos. in the morning and 34nos. in the afternoon shift.
- 8. Karate training for students has been introduced since 2018-19 session. Every student of the centre is given training once a week. This has improved general, physical and mental strength of students and improved their general confidence level. These classes were re-commenced in later part of the year. A group of children performed the Karate drills in the annual function of Mahavir International Delhi an associate NGO on the occasion of "Eye Care Day"
- 9. To the existing pool of around 270 books, 230 books have been added in the student library. Weekly distribution of books is being done for Class III by rotation.

B) Computer Literacy Program

With a view to enhancing skills of the students and to make them fit for gainful employment, computer training program for 12th pass students from the slums was started in the year 2009 with only 6 students. So far twelve batches totaling 380 students have got trained.

Due to COVID-19, classes for computer training got disrupted as all training institutes were not allowed to function. The XIII th batch was however commenced in November 2021 with 30 candidates and has been in progress with certain breaks owing to the Pandemic related restrictions. It will be completed by July –August 2022.

It is a matter of great satisfaction that the students who have undergone these computer courses have been able to get gainful employment. They are being regularly guided towards a respectable and bright future.

All expenses for these courses are met with by Godhuli.

C) Nursery Teacher's Training (NTT)

It had been observed that some of the Class XII pass students of the slum areas wanted to adopt Teaching as a profession. This prompted us to start the first batch of the one year Nursery teacher's Training (NTT) course for 10 students in August 2016.

Three batches have been completed so far. No batch could be started in 2021-22 due to the COVID induced restrictions.

All expenses of the courses are borne by Godhuli.

D) Tutorial Education

Noticing the fall in the academic levels of children in Mirabagh slums owing to cessation of conventional school for nearly two years, Godhuli commenced tutorial education for children of classes 6th to 9th in December 2021. Around 45 students were initially enrolled in the programme, which entailed classes in the three traditional tough subjects of English, Maths and Science. The performance of these children in their school assessment have been quite encouraging.

6.2 Nangloi Centre

Sainik Colony Chaupal, Lakshmi Park, Nangloi, New Delhi – 110041

This school in Nangloi was started in April, 2016 for KG class for street / slum children of the area after entering into an agreement with the Saini family who have made available their premises for the said activity.

Learning at Godhuli is multifaceted as we encourage the students to improve their knowledge, basic habits and moral duties while growing strong physically, mentally, socially and spiritually.

Within a short span of time, the school has gained immense popularity among the poor population of the area.

During the year, keeping in view the on and off periods of COVIC Pandemic, the following activities were carried out —

1. The school was closed in April, May and June' 21 and opened on 3rd July for on line / selective attendance mode of teaching.

The teachers were able to reach out to about 70% students for worksheets etc and total of 78 nos were contacted by phone and given tips for taking up their homework and for adopting precautionary measures

- 2. The teachers have uploaded about 180 nos. videos on Godhuli Shiksha Channel.
- 3. In addition to regular work allocation of worksheets, children were also called on Saturdays in non-lockdown periods to make up their deficiencies.
- 4. Karate classes were re- started from mid- July and continued every Wednesday.

- 5. Independence Day and Diwali Celebrations were celebrated with proper fanfare. Annual Sports Day was conducted on 16th March' 2022.
- 6. Covid awareness programs were undertaken with mask and sanitizer distribution using e-rickshaws in Nangloi Community.
- 7. Food packets with Rice, Dal, Sugar, Salt, Tea and wheat floor were distribuited among families of students on different days with help of NSFDC.
- 8. **Construction of New Building** As the existing Building required extensive repairs, the matter was discussed with the Saini Family and after signing an agreement for helping them financially in return for custodianship of the rebuilt premises for a period of five years, the construction of the New Building was commenced by them in March'22.

The new Building has since been completed in early July and classes have been started in the new premises. Further, the other required works like provision of Flooring, woodwork for office, blackboards etc. have also been completed.

The construction of the New Building has made available extra space for the classes and has considerably improved the outlook of the centre.

9. During the academic year 2021-22, 75 nos. students were admitted and all were mainstreamed.

6.3 Kalyanpuri Centre

Basti Vikas Kendra, Near Dhobi Ghat, Kalyanpuri, Delhi – 110091

The school has been functioning satisfactorily since November 2015. when Delhi Govt. had allotted two rooms in the local Basti Vikas Kendra in a cluster of slums .

Children in age group 4-6 years are taken in KG class and prepared for taking up further school studies.

Immediately after the school opens for a new session, the teachers regularly visit the locality households to motivate/bring the children to school.

In the year 2021-22, regular teaching was not possible till very late because of Pandemic as also due to the peculiar situation of this centre with large number of parents depending upon seasonal employment. However, all out efforts were made, after opening, in Oct'21, to take up the possible tasks. The school opened initially for two days and later on for four days per week and the following specific items were taken up –

- About 20 students in different sections regularly attended school sctivities. Work sheets were distributed once a week. Total about 4000 work sheets comprising of Hindi, English Maths and Drawing were distributed.
- ii) During Lock Down period the teachers regularly made videos from home and uploaded on You Tube on Godhuli Shiksha Channel.

 Total 220 videos were posted.
- iii) Health check up camp was organized for the students and their families.

- iv) 15 students from the old batch of 20 nos. have been mainstreamed.
- v) Pending Rent has been paid to the authorities and is presently updated upto July'23.
- vi) Proper Covid Protocol was maintained and the students impressed upon to follow the laid down precautions.

The functioning of the centre has had a positive impact as some older children, who had dropped out from conventional schools, have also been motivated to the school during the year. However, presently the current batch is entirely of the KG level only.

7. Closed Schools

7.1 Patparganj School

In May 1995, GODHULI started a primary school at Patparganj, East Delhi. The School was being run in a building of the MCD and GODHULI provided education, study materials and school uniform, all free. The school was discontinued w.e.f. 1st August, 2008 when all students were mainstreamed due to Government Policy.

7.2 Khichripur School

This school was started in 2009 at Khichripur, Delhi-110091 and had two KG classes for children in age group 4 to 6 years. This school had, however, to be closed w.e.f. 1st April 2014 due to withdrawal of accommodation by the authority.

7.3 Sagarpur School

The Sagarpur centre was started in 2011 in collaboration with CMM Charitable Trust, Godhuli had to terminate the arrangement due to paucity of students because of mushrooming of other Govt.schools and Aanganwadis in that area. and the centre was closed down in May '2020.

OUR AIM

GODHULI primarily aims to provide free education to non-school going street/ slum children (age four plus), as envisaged under articles 24, 45, and 21A of the Constitution, and 'The Right of Children to Free and Compulsory Education Act, 2009', until they can be mainstreamed into the formal schools, and thereafter, to the extent possible, to mentor them so that they do not drop out. For selected students in Classes 6th to 12th, a project of providing Tutorial Classes has also been started from January '2022

Attendance

During normal periods, the attendance in the schools remains quite satisfactory. Children look smart in their uniforms and have shown improvement in physical appearance.

It is very encouraging to note that the children and their parents show excellent response and there are hardly any cases of students dropping out from our schools.

National Days, Festivals & Holidays

The schools normally observe Gandhi Jayanti, Independence Day, Republic Day, Diwali, Dussehra ,BalDiwas, Christmas Day and New Year Celebrations. On these occassions the school premises are decorated with flags, balloons etc. and the functions include recitation of patriotic songs and dance programmes by the students followed by award of prizes to winners and distribution of sweets.

In the current year, following Covid Protocols, most of the festivals were celebrated on line.

There are normally no vacations except Sundays and national and festival holidays, so that the children are not diverted away from education.

12. Registration under FCRA and other Government Regulations

Godhuli has been registered under Foreign Contribution (Regulation) Act, 1976 for accepting donations in foreign currency without prior permission from the Ministry of Home Affairs under Registration No. 23166824 of March 2019. For this the Society has opened account no. 40108898935 in State bank of India, New Delhi main Branch.

Godhuli is additionally registered with NGO Darpan Portal of Govt. of India with ID No.DL/2018/0187530.

Godhuli also stands registered with Ministry of Corporate Affairs (MCA) as an entity authorized to undertake CSR activities with Registration No CSR00003127

13. Exemption from Income Tax

All donations to the GODHULI are exempt from Indian Income Tax under Section 80(G) of the Act, vide order dated 02-10-2021 issued by Principal Commissioner of Income Tax (Exemptions), The exemptions stand valid till Assessment Year (AY-2026-27). The Society is also registered under Clause 12 A of the IT Act for a period co-terminus with the 80g exemption.

14. Office of Godhuli

Godhuli's registered office is at 513, Sector A , Pocket C , VasantKunj, New Delhi – 110070. The space for its administrative office has been very kindly provided for by Dr. C.M.Bhagat, Vice Chairman –II at his hospital premises in the 1st Floor of Bhagat Chandra Hospital, RZF-1/1, Mahavir Enclave, PalamDabri Road, New Delhi.

• To mobilise and motivate children to restart physical attendance in full strength

• To continue the vocational education interventions for under privileged youth of the Meerabagh/Nangloi area in Computers and

NTT till such time as prevalent conditions normalise

· Arrange regular Medical check-up camps for students.

• To continue updation of the renovated Nangloi School Building in consultation with the Saini Family.

• To strengthen the involved systems for the newly started Tutorial Classes at Meerabagh by way of increase in number of

students, adequacy of attendance, systematic follow-up of the syllabus and involvement of parents.
